Here's how it works:

- 3. Send the registration form, the hiking log, and payment to the address shown at the bottom of the registration form.

We will send you a hiking award patch and certificate of completion. We'll also record your name in our Chippewa Moraine register.

Highlights of the Chippewa Moraine Segments

Chippewa County's Ice Age Trail offers a unique journey through Wisconsin's glacial past as well as beautiful scenery. Traveling west to east, the first segment is the 7.8-mile Chippewa Moraine Segment which passes 21 kettle lakes. Visit the **David R. Obey Ice Age Interpretive Center**, built on an ice-walled lake plain. The Center has many interactive activities and displays about geologic, cultural, and natural history. It also has maps, drinking water, restrooms, and Ice Age Trail merchandise for sale. For information, call 715-967-2800.

The 5.8-mile Harwood Segment traverses the Chippewa County Forest and features large beaver dams, a massive glacial erratic, scenic pristine lakes, and wetland areas.

The 8.2-mile Firth Lake Segment includes a grooved top ridge and a 700+ foot boardwalk along a 500-foot beaver dam.

The Chippewa River Segment, an easy 1.9 miles, winds along high above the banks of the beautiful Chippewa River and through the Krank Preserve.

Travel a connecting route to Cornell, WI, one of the many Trail communities on the Ice Age Trail. Visit the Mill Yard Park which has the only remaining Pulpwood Stacker in the world. Stop in at the Cornell Visitor Center located there. After hiking through Cornell, you can take the 24.7-mile route suggested in the Atlas, or plan your own route to the County Line at County H.

Whether it be sampling ice



cream treats, grabbing a bite to eat, or staying the night, enjoy this small town's hospitality.

Cornell Highlights:

The Mill Yard Park is located on Hwy. 64 as you enter town across the Blue Bridge. There is a pavilion with rest rooms, ball fields, and a kayak launch. Many community events are held there.

The Cornell Visitor Center is located at the Mill Yard Park and open May-Sept. Stop in to learn about the history of Cornell and its famous Stacker and purchase Ice Age Trail merchandise. Bathrooms are available, too.

Brunet Island State Park which offers 1,300 acres of scenic beauty and recreational opportunities is located one mile from the Mill Yard Park. Hiking trails and camping are available as well as showers and flush toilets in the South Campground.

The Old Abe Bike Trail runs from Brunet Island to Chippewa Falls. This rail-to-trail path connects Brunet Island to Lake Wissota State Park.

The Jean Brunet Park on Main Street has a pavilion, playground, and bathrooms.
