Volunteers to Construct New Boardwalk and Bridge for Ice Age National Scenic Trail at John Muir County Park

Project partly funded by Athletic Brewing and National Park Trust

Cross Plains, Wis (July 5, 2023) –Volunteers will converge in Marquette County next week to learn about Trailbuilding and construct a new boardwalk and bridge for the Ice Age National Scenic Trail.

This will happen as part of the Ice Age Trail University (IAT-U) event, hosted by the Ice Age Trail Alliance, which is taking place at John Muir County Park, July 12-16.

The nearly 70 volunteers who will participate get to choose which topics they want to learn more about, including:

- **Boardwalk Construction** learn the step-by-step process for constructing boardwalks, including how to design a boardwalk, and meet compliance standards.
- **Tread Maintenance** find out how to deberm, clean drainage, and keep brush back from existing tread.
- **Trail Plumbing** learn how to fix Trail drainage issues, identify small issues before they become larger, and keep the Trail hydrologically invisible and sustainable.
- Intro to Vegetative Management learn the basics on native and invasive plant identification, how to control invasive species, and why restoration is important to wildlife and hikers.
- Signage Learn the standards for clear, consistent signage along the Trail.
- **First Aid/CPR** Get the certification you need to stay safe along the Trail and participate in Trailbuilding events.
- And More

"IAT-U events are a highlight of the Trailbuilding season," says Chad DuChateau, Director of Trail Operations for the Ice Age Trail Alliance. "It gives Alliance staff and volunteers the time to delve deep into Trailbuilding and maintenance. You learn the reasons why things are done a certain way," he says. "And, you have the chance to really perfect a skill."

All IAT-U courses are taught by Alliance staff or other official Alliance crew leaders.

Structure Funded by Athletic Brewing's Two for the Trails Grant Program and National Park Trust Challenge Cost Share

All four days of IAT-U will include boardwalk construction courses and hands-on experience building a boardwalk and bridge along the John Muir Park Segment of the Ice Age Trail.

The boardwalk and bridge will replace a smaller structure built 20+ years ago, which is in disrepair. To better reflect the beauty of the area, protect the Trail, and improve the hiker experience, the new boardwalk will be twice as long (about 350 feet) and completely cover perpetually wet areas of Trail.

Funding for the boardwalk and bridge comes from Athletic Brewing, which provided a *Two for the Trails Grant* to the Alliance for materials and supplies for the new structures.

In addition, this project was made possible by an award from the National Park Service and National Park Trust.

The new boardwalk and bridge will be open when the project concludes on July 16.
